


Doggy Dress-Up

"And we have doggy treats for your wonderfully dressed-up pups," said Mom.




"Apollo had a superhero cape," said Jayden. "But it ripped off on our way over."




Peggy Ashbrook is an early childhood science educator.

🕤 Spray.

Adult: Preheat the oven to 350°F. Spray two loaf pans with cooking spray.



In a medium bowl, mix flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt, and baking soda.

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You Need

Cooking spray

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 4 large eggs
- 1½ cups sugar
- 1 (15-ounce) can pumpkin
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup applesauce
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup chocolate chips

Pumpkin Bread





🛞 Whisk.

In a large bowl, whisk eggs. Add sugar, pumpkin, oil, applesauce, vanilla, and chocolate chips.

4 Pour.

Mix wet and dry ingredients in the large bowl. Pour the batter into the pans. *Adult: Bake 50–55 minutes.*

Paint a Pumpkin

You Need

- ★ Tray
- ⋆ Paper
- ⋆ Metal rack
- * Pumpkin
- ⋆ Acrylic paint
- ★ Water
- * Squeeze bottle



Cover.

Cover a tray with paper. Set metal rack and pumpkin on tray.



Squeezy fun: No brush needed!



Mix three parts paint and one part water in a squeeze bottle.





Squeeze the bottle in a circular motion above the pumpkin. When finished, let dry overnight.
